From the Desk of Todd Rosvold

What a difference a year can make. As we enter into the Fall harvest season and reflect back on the past

> 12 months it's been a time of challenge for Agriculture. Dairy farmers have had a particularly hard time, with milk prices paid to them 25% to 50% less than a year

ago. Most of us living in town would be bankrupt in a matter of months with a wage reduction like that. The futures pricing of milk is a few dollars more than the current price, but most farmer's cost of operation is still higher than forecasts. Let's hope we see price improvement soon.

This cooperative runs on milk and the low dairy prices have combined with an industry record fertilizer devaluation. Our fertilizer devaluation here was more than \$800,000. This, with fewer purchases by farmers, gave us losses we were unable to recoup in our fiscal year ended July 31, 2009. We're not alone in this respect and many Wisconsin cooperatives and private fertilizer dealers experienced similar, and in some cases, many times the devaluation losses we had. The fertilizer industry has struggled with price volatility for the last few years, and while markets have pulled back significantly from a year ago, we remain aware that they could increase again with little or no warning. The Board and management are continuing to explore strategies to minimize price risk to our members and cooperative. Unfortunately, fertilizer markets are not as developed as the stock market or grain markets so other strategies will need to be employed.

On a better note, your cooperative's financial strength remains strong and the work done in the last few years to build that strength for difficult times, like last year, have paid off well. We are very optimistic that the

farming economy and overall economy will improve, and that there will be opportunities for businesses and cooperatives with adequate financial strength to grow and prosper as we move forward out of the recession. Our annual meeting will be November 12 at the Rock Garden Supper Club in Green Bay and all members are invited to hear how their cooperative fared this last year.

I spoke before of opportunities and one opportunity we are moving forward with is the new store building. As we've noted before, our old Hardware store roof sustained severe snow load damage two years ago and required a major investment in an old building and roof to repair. Replacing the roof was not an option because the supporting walls weren't capable of the stress of the project. Looking to the future, your Board made a decision to move forward with the co-op and it's Hardware and Parts business and we are now a few weeks away from Schuh Construction completing this project. Our Hardware store was one of two departments to have a sales increase this last fiscal year under very tough economic conditions and we are working hard to make sure that trend continues.

This month is October is Co-op Month and we will be recognizing cooperatives and the cooperative way of doing business with an open house on October 27. We won't have the Hardware store up and running yet, but it will give our members a chance to see the latest addition to our main co-op complex and enjoy free dairy products. Hope to see you soon. ◆

Feed and Grain Department

The Pulaski Chase Cooperative Feed and Grain department has a full line of dry and water soluble inoculants for treating your corn silage. We also have inoculants and propionic acid products for treating your high moisture corn.

Inoculants are important for lowering the number of yeasts in your corn silage, which will result in lower nutrient and dry matter losses. Inoculants are also important for aerobic stability which can mean higher dry matter recovery, longer bunk life, less spoilage, more available nutrients and greater palatability.
