CHINA SYNDROME

We are finding out rather quickly it's not what you see but what you get. About three years ago China came to America and bought the largest single producer of pork in America called Smithfield. At first it looked like China would start to export vast quantities of American pork. The reality is they bought the company to learn from Americans how they can produce their own pork in their homeland by copying the American system. There are now 35 brand new mega farms in China producing 25 million pigs a year and they look exactly like ours in the Midwest.

The second example is ChemChina purchasing the giant Syngenta which will greatly advance their intellectual rights in seed traits and crop inputs. That technology will help China grow bigger crops faster in their homeland. China conveniently shut down US imports because of a MIR 162 "illegal trait" found in corn we exported to them causing corn prices to fall. Ironically, that trait was developed and sold by Syngenta in the US.

OIL WAR

Consumers are enjoying the price of fuel these days, but here are the facts behind the scene. The Saudis have declared war on the price of oil in order to squeeze other producers like Russia, Iran, American shale oil and biofuels. Saudis have a production cost of \$20 a barrel for crude. Saudi Arabia is the lowest cost producer. The longer prices are lower, the sooner someone will cry uncle and fold their cards. The best cure for low prices is low prices and we have not seen a cease fire from any of the players.

ICE COVERAGE

The first 10 days of March usually records the highest ice cover on the Great Lakes. Last year on February 28, it was 89 percent and the year before it was 85 percent. Both years set records back-to-back for trendline crop yields. On February 29, this year's coverage is only 7 percent. History shows a high correlation between Great Lakes ice coverage and crop yields the next season. Low ice coverage tends to equate below trendline yields.

Also, another weather firm called T-Storm Weather Research has found that wet Decembers translate many years into below trendline yields the next season. Much of the Midwest had record precipitation in December including us! Many think the current price of December corn, before a major growing season, is getting too cheap.

The straighter the better says the research.

A NEW CROP YEAR BEGINS

As spring approaches plans are being made or modified for your cropping acres. We ask ourselves, do I plant more corn, more soybeans, or do I maintain my crop rotation? Which option will bring me the most return? What kind of weather will the spring and summer bring? You may even be wondering what opportunities you will have to market your crop and at what level.



The USDA recently released their first report from Agricultural Outlook Forum for the 2016 crop year. Some of the highlights of the report were:

- Corn acres of 90 million, increasing by 2 million acres from last year, with production at 13.825 billion bushels. If realized, this would be the third largest crop produced and would push ending stocks to 1.9997 billion bushels. This would be the largest ending stocks in 12 years.
- Soybean acres of 82.5 million are slightly smaller than last year, with production of 3.810 billion bushels. Ending stocks for soybeans would be 440 million bushels down from 450 million last year but still the largest in 10 years.
- Projected prices for 2016-17 are \$3.45 for corn and \$8.50 for soybeans. This compares with projections of \$3.60 and \$8.80 last year.
- · Record production of meat and milk is projected.
- China's annual growth is projected at 5.3 percent down from a nearly 10 percent growth rate. China has been the world's largest importer of corn and beans.
- Exports are facing strong competition and reduced demand. Export volumes have been down for most grains but the meat trade exports have been steady to improving.
- Farm income projected at \$51 billion down 44 percent since 2014.

US farmers grew the three largest corn crops in 2013, 2014, and 2015. Soybean record yields were also raised in 2014 and 2015. What will 2016 bring?
